

IX. Prevention History:

1. Protecting the child from accidental hazards such as electricity plugs (electrocution) poisoning (drugs and household detergents, corrosives, insecticides), fire, motor vehicle accidents. etc. must be asked for.
2. Immunization History:
List the type of immunization, the number and dates given, and the child's reaction, if any. When details are important, request the vaccination card.

X. Allergy History:

Ask about any allergies to medications, foods, animals, grass, etc. and how the allergy manifests (i.e. What was the child's allergic reaction).

XI. Family History:

A genetic chart (pedigree) may be used in the family history and should include parents, siblings and grandparents, with their ages, and state of health. Parental consanguinity needs to be known.

Inquire about a family history of diseases such as allergy; blood, disease, hearth disease, lung disease, kidney disease, tuberculosis, diabetes, rheumatic fever, convulsions or mental disorders, skin or gastrointestinal disease, etc.

XII. Social History:

Data on home living conditions should include details such as whether the family lives in a house or an apartment, whether the mother works and if so who looks after the her children when she is working, and the father's employment.

XIII. Review of Systems:

Review of systems supplements the history of present illness, and information included there need not be repeated here.

Head: Injuries, headache

Eyes: Visual changes, crossed (squint) or tendency to cross, discharge, redness, puffiness, injuries, glasses and double vision.

Ears: Difficulty in hearing, pain, discharge, history of infections

Nose: Discharge (watery or purulent), difficulty in breathing through nose, epistaxis

Mouth and Throat: Sore throat or tongue, difficulty in swallowing, dental problems.
