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

NEH: Research Misconduct Policy

Definition	Procedures for Adjudication and Appeal	
Findings	Closing of the Case	
Responsibility for Inquiry, Investigation, and Adjudication of Allegations	Timeliness: within six months with extension allowance	
Response to an Allegation	Safeguards for Informants	
Procedures for Inquiry and Investigation	Safeguards for Subjects of Allegations	
Notification of the subject of the allegation	Confidentiality: during the inquiry, investigation, and decision-making Processes	

NEH: Definition of Research Misconduct

Definition	"Fabrication, Falsification, or Plagiarism (FFP)" in proposing, performing, reporting, or reviewing research (& research results)
Fabrication	Making up (& reporting) data or results
Falsification	Manipulating research materials, equipment, or processes, or changing data or results such that research is not accurately represented.
Plagiarism	Appropriation of another person's ideas, processes, results, or words without giving appropriate credit.
Exception	Honest errors or differences of opinion.
